Dear Residents:

I hope everyone had a safe and relaxing summer. My staff, Council and I have been working on many projects in the Village and I am pleased to give you an update.

This past spring, the Village applied for a Playground Grant from Cuyahoga County Department of Community Development. The Village was awarded \$35,000 to install a playground for children from 5 to 12 years old at the Donald N. Payne Athletic Complex. The Village accepted competitive bids on the project and Council awarded a contract to David Williams & Associates, Inc. Work is expected to begin shortly and the project is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2010.

The Village also applied for a Storm Water grant from the Ohio EPA. We were awarded a \$63,000 grant to install a bioswale in the parking area of Village Hall and natural plants in the rip-rap of Tinker's Creek at the Pettibone Road Bridge. These plants will help stabilize the stones and enhance the health of the creek. After accepting bids on this project, Council awarded a contract to Brookside Lawn Services. This portion of work is scheduled to begin in early October.

Mike Henry, the Village Engineer, has been working on two other projects which are the focus of grants to be submitted this fall. One grant application is for the Phase I Sanitary Sewer Project for the Pergl/Annetta/Mello areas. The second grant application is for a street alignment at Broadway and Richmond Roads in cooperation with the Village of Oakwood. We will find out next spring if we will receive either of these grants.





- Cut "Y" Shaped Branches in Two
- No Firewood – No Logs Less Than 4 Feet Long
- Separate Small from Large Branches
- Face "Cut End" of Branches Towards the Road

PERGL – ANNETTA – MELLO – PETTIBONE SANITARY SERVICE AREA



As a follow up to the July 21st and August 16th public meetings, the Village wanted to inform all the residents of Pergl – Annetta – Mello - Pettibone Road (without current access to sanitary sewers) what was discussed and what the Village will do relative to sanitary service within your area.

After discussing concerns with residents of both septic systems and gravity sewers, there was an overwhelming response from the residents for the Village to pursue the extension of gravity sewers to service the area. The extension of sewers is an expensive process and to reduce the cost, the Village will begin applying for grants and loan opportunities.

This Fall, the Village will apply for grant funding from a number of government agencies. We will be notified by February or March of 2011 on the status of the funding. These funding applications are very competitive and the application process will place our Village against numerous other municipalities applying for the same dollars. If we are successful in obtaining grant funding, construction of the gravity sewer would begin next summer (July 2011) with the anticipated completion slated for winter of 2012. As we move forward with this plan and have more absolute schedules and timing, you will be updated accordingly.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM

This is a Federal program from the Dept. of Housing & Urban Development that is administered by Cuyahoga County to communities within the County. It can be used for various projects within the Village in accordance with the Federal guidelines. The Village has applied for and received these grants for projects such as the Pettibone Road and Austin Powder Streetscapes, Richmond Road Sanitary Sewer Project and a new Master Plan in 2009.

The Village would like to submit an application for the 2011 Program Year. We would like input from the community on various projects you would like to see within the Village.

The Village will be holding a public hearing on Wednesday, Oct. 6 at 7:30 PM at Village Hall to further discuss the proposed 2011 CDBG grant and its program. Please try to attend. The Village would like to hear from you on this program. A representative from Cuyahoga County will also be present at the Public Hearing to answer any questions about this grant and the CDBG Program.



VALLEY SENIOR TRANSPORTATION SERVICE



Transportation service is available to senior residents of the Villages of Bentleyville, Chagrin Falls, Glenwillow and the City of Solon. To register, call the

City of Solon Department of Senior Services at 440-349-6363.

- Transportation is available on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday with pick-up times between 8:30 AM to 3:15 PM. Travel may be to locations in Cuyahoga and limited locations in Lake, Geauga and Summit Counties.
- Costs are:
 - No charge for transportation within the resident's own municipality.
 - \$2.00 each way for distances less than ten (10) miles.
 - \$3.00 each way for distances greater than ten (10) miles.
- Transportation is available for medical appointments, routine errands, recreation, religious and social events. No transportation will be provided following surgical procedures.
- Reservations for van service may be made by contacting the Solon Senior Center at 440-349-6363, Monday thru Friday, 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM. Calls received during the hours of 8:30 AM – 11:30 AM will be taken by a staff member. Appointment calls received after 11:30 AM will be taken via voice mail and a staff member will return the call within 24 hours to confirm availability. Reservations for:
 - Trips to medical appointments begin on the 1st of the month for the following month (September 1st for October appointments. If the 1st of the month falls on a day that the SSC is not open, reservations will begin on the day the SSC reopens).
 - Other trips will begin every Monday at 8:30 AM for the following week. If the SSC is not open on Monday, reservations will begin on Tuesday.
- The name of the rider, date and time of travel, as well as the address and phone number of the destination are required to schedule a trip.

- The van driver is not permitted to cross the threshold of the resident's home. If assistance is needed entering or exiting the van, one adult company may accompany the rider and will be charged at the same rate as the rider.
- The driver will assist with taking up to four (4) bags to the door, but may not carry packages into the house.

LEGAL AID FOR SENIORS

The Legal Aid Society of Cleveland offers free legal services to low-income seniors. In Cuyahoga County, call 216-687-1900 or call toll free 1-888-817-3777.

If you qualify for their services and they have the resources to assist you, they will either give you advice or educational information to help you with the next steps in the legal process, refer you to a volunteer attorney, or represent you in your legal matter.

If necessary, you may need to meet with an attorney. If you are unable to come to their downtown Cleveland office at 1223 West Sixth Street, an attorney can arrange to meet you at a senior citizen center or some other office near your home.

WRITE THE WHITE HOUSE

The White House will send greeting cards signed by the President of the United States to commemorate special events, accomplishments or milestones free of charge to U.S. citizens. To request a greeting card from the President, just follow these guidelines from the White House Greeting Officer: **Requests may be submitted through the office of your U.S. Senator, Sherrod Brown. Requests can also be mailed, at least six weeks in advance of the event to: White House, 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, D.C. 20502. For faster service, requests can also be faxed to 202-456-2461.**

ANNIVERSARY GREETINGS will be sent to couples who are celebrating a 50th, 60th, 70th or later wedding anniversary.

BIRTHDAY GREETINGS will be sent only to people turning 80 or older or veterans turning 70 or older.

FLU SHOTS



- Flu shots are being made available at the Village Hall Council Chambers on Thursday, October 7, 2010 from 9:00 AM - 10:30 AM only.

The Cuyahoga County Board of Health, in cooperation with the Mayor and Council, is sponsoring the vaccine program. It is open to all residents as well as the public. Anyone is at risk for infection, but rates are higher if you are of age 60 years and older, or an adult who has a chronic illness.

Persons eligible for Medicare Part B as their primary insurance must bring their Medicare cards with them for billing purposes. If you are not on Medicare, the charge for the flu shot will be \$30.00 payable that day.

Many seniors have signed their Medicare Benefits over to a Medicare HMO insurance policy. Below is a list of Medicare HMO Insurance Companies that the Cuyahoga County Board of Health cannot bill for reimbursement:

ATTENTION BUSINESS OWNERS AND RESIDENTS

LICENSE PLATES FOR MOTOR VEHICLES

(Trucks, residential and commercial)

When renewing your annual license plate or sticker, make sure you state that you live or operate your business in GLENWILLOW so the Village can receive its portion of the license tax fee. Glenwillow shares a zip code with Solon; therefore, many times it is registered incorrectly. The Registrar will indicate the community name on your registration if you tell them. There is no increase in the tax. If Glenwillow does not receive its share, the tax will go to another community.



ARE YOU HAVING PROBLEMS WITH YOUR CABLE COMPANY?

The Ohio Department of Commerce's Cable TV Consumer Hotline is 1-800-686-7826. The hotline provides assistance to cable television consumers who are unable to resolve issues with their cable television provider.

Since September 2007, the Department of Commerce has received more than 5,000 consumer complaints concerning billing disputes, poor picture quality, equipment malfunctions, and cancelled or missed service appointments. The Department will investigate these types of complaints, forward them to the respective cable companies, and request that they resolve the issue directly with the consumer. The Department then will follow up to ensure that the complainant has been contacted by the company and the issue has been addressed.


Authorized cable television providers are required under Chapter 1332 of Ohio's Video Service Authorization law to:

- Restore cable service within 72 hours after the customer reports the problem unless the problem was caused by a natural disaster.
- Credit the customer's account for a service interruption (depending on the cause and duration).
- Provide 30 days advance written notice before removing a channel.
- Provide 30 days advance written notice prior to a rate increase.
- Provide 10 days advance written notice before disconnecting service.

The Department does not have jurisdiction in areas where the cable television provider operates under a valid, unexpired franchise agreement with a local jurisdiction. The Department also does not have authority to regulate satellite companies, internet service, or phone service provided by cable television companies.

BASIC FDIC INSURANCE COVERAGE PERMANENTLY INCREASED TO \$250,000 PER DEPOSITOR



On July 21, 2010, President Barack Obama signed the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection

Act, which, in part, permanently raises the current standard maximum deposit insurance amount to \$250,000. The standard maximum insurance amount of \$100,000 has been temporarily raised to \$250,000 until December 31, 2013. The FDIC insurance coverage limit applies per depositor, per insured depository institution for each account ownership category.

The temporary increase from \$100,000 to \$250,000 was effective from October 3, 2008, through December 31, 2010. On May 20, 2009, the temporary increase was extended through December 31, 2013.

“With this permanent increase of deposit insurance to \$250,000, depositors with CDs above \$100,000 but below \$250,000 will no longer have to worry about losing coverage on those CDs maturing beyond 2013. We strongly encourage all bank depositors who have questions about their insurance coverage to go to our Web site at www.fdic.gov and use our Electronic Deposit Insurance Estimator (Edie) OR CALL OUR TOLL-FREE NUMBER AT 1-877-ASK-FDIC. Insured deposits provide the comfort and peace of mind to depositors that their money is 100 percent safe – provided they keep their deposit balances within the insurance limits”, said FDIC Chairman Shelia C. Bair.

To help consumers, bankers and others understand how the new law affects deposit insurance coverage and to help consumers verify whether their deposit accounts are fully protected, the FDIC provides the following resources:

- **Information on deposit insurance on the FDIC Web site:** Updated brochures on deposit insurance coverage (including the basic guide, Deposit Insurance summary, and the more comprehensive guide, Your Insured Deposits) and a new version of the “Electronic Deposit Insurance Estimator” (Edie), an interactive service that allows consumers to quickly and easily check whether their accounts are fully protected, are now available on the FDIC’s Web site (www.fdic.gov).

- **A toll free consumer assistance line:** Help and information about deposit insurance and other matters of interest to bank customers are available at 1-877-ASK-FDIC (1-877-275-3342) Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM, Eastern Time. For the hearing impaired the number is 1-800-925-4618.

Congress created the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in 1933 to restore public confidence in the nation’s banking system. The FDIC insured deposits at the nation’s 7,932 banks and savings associations and it promotes the safety and soundness of these institutions by identifying, monitoring and addressing risks to which they are exposed. The FDIC received no federal tax dollars – insured financial institutions fund its operations.

GLENWILLOW BIOSWALE FIELD DAY OCTOBER 9, 2010

On Saturday, October 9, 2010, at 9:00 AM at the Gazebo behind Village Hall, volunteers from the Village of Glenwillow will be planting an assortment of perennials, such as Indian Blanket, Purple Dome Aster, Cerise Queen Yarrow, Rising Sun, Blazing Star and Blue Flag Iris, Fountain and Karl Forester’s Feather Reed Grass and Orange Coneflowers. The flowers will be planted in the four bioswales.

Volunteers will be working with plants, soil

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and mulch so please wear sturdy shoes and clothes that can get dirty. Please bring a

trowel or shovel and gardening gloves. Bottled water and light refreshments will be provided.

Tinker’s Creek Watershed Partners and Cuyahoga Soil & Water Conservation District will be in attendance to answer watershed and water quality questions. Handouts will be provided with take home instructions to attendees for installing rain gardens and bioswales at home.

Trick or Treat is Sunday, October 31st from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM and it is quickly approaching! Remember these safety tips to help make your child's Halloween a safe one:

-  All Children should be accompanied by an adult
-  Parents should inspect all treats before children eat them
-  Use a flashlight or wear reflective, bright colors so drivers can see you after dark
-  Walk on sidewalks or as near to the curb as possible
-  Be sure mask holes are large enough to see through them safely

BOW HUNTING


Bow hunting season is here. It begins September 25th and ends on February 6th. The following requirements are necessary to bow hunt deer in the Village of Glenwillow.



- *Bow hunting deer is restricted to property owners, residents of Glenwillow and invited guests of the property owner only. (Maximum of 30 non-residents or guests permits are to be issued per deer season by the Police Chief).*
- *Minimum of three continuous acres required. Adjoining property owners may enter into an agreement in order to meet the minimum acreage (bow hunter must have written permission of the property owner). Any questions regarding the size of land parcels will require a letter from the Village of Glenwillow Building Department to verify the acreage requirement.*
- *Bow hunters must have a valid Ohio State Hunting license with deer permit and comply with all State of Ohio hunting regulations.*
- *All bow hunters must register annually with the Village Police Chief and show proof of successful completion of the hunter safety training course. (Mandatory).*
- *All bow hunters must carry proof of registration issued by the Village of Glenwillow Police Department in addition to a valid hunting license and written permission to hunt signed by the property owner.*
- *All bow hunters must remain on the property that they have registered to hunt. Any violations may result in prosecution.*
- *Register at the Glenwillow Police Department, Monday through Friday, 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM.*
